### A Message from our Board Chair



The Humane Society of Southern Arizona is on a mission to be the most innovative and effective animal welfare agency this side of the Mississippi, and Fiscal Year 2016 saw huge advances on this front in just about every aspect of our organization.

HSSA helped drive Tucson to the top of the pack, beating out pet-friendly cities around the nation to become the winner of Pet360's Top City for Pets. HSSA was also awarded the Tucson Weekly's "2016 Best Place to Donate Your Time and Money" for the 3rd year in a row, and we took home a prize for "Reader's Choice for Best NonProfit, 2016" from the Arizona Daily Star. Perhaps the most impressive thing we're doing is building a brand new facility - one that puts into practice the most recent advances in animal welfare, and helps us to plan for an even better and brighter future.

It's our innovation and scope of vision that drives the accolades and awards. This year, we transferred in 1,644 pets from high-risk situations, including an emergency run to help address the critical need during the Cedar Creek Fire (see page inside for more). Ninety-six percent of the animals in our care found loving forever homes, and that's just scratching the surface of the impact we've made.

Our quest to save as many animals as we can continues. From community engagement and education, to raising funds for animals with special medical needs, we are working every day to make Tucson the best place on earth to be a pet.

# Keeping pets safe





### Pet Safety and First Aid Classes


In Fiscal Year 2016, HSSA hosted Pet Safety and First Aid Classes. These classes are more than just a program on how to conduct CPR or treat medical emergencies for pets. Participants learn how to prevent emergencies; assist their veterinarian in treating their pet; keep animals safe from local environmental hazards; avoid poisonous plants and household dangers; and identify and react to cruelty and neglect issues. Most importantly, participants are taught the true benefits of prevention!

### Rattlesnake Avoidance Training at HSSA

Nothing is scarier in Southern Arizona than taking your dog out for a walk and hearing the sounds of a rattlesnake. We teamed up with trained professionals from Animal Experts Inc., and Adobe Dog Trainers to train dogs to use their eyes, ears, and noses to avoid rattlesnake bites. Over 150 dogs completed this training in Fiscal Year 2016.







# Going the extra mile

#### New Mexico Transfer

In January 2016, the Humane Society of Southern Arizona completed our first out-of-state pet transfer. A team traveled seven hours to a small community in New Mexico after receiving a desperate plea from a shelter manager. The county-run shelter was being forced to euthanize up to a dozen dogs per day, due to over-crowding issues. We were able to bring home over 20 dogs, including a pregnant mama that would give birth only a few days after making it to Tucson. This mission jump-started our community's support for shelter transfers from high risk euthanasia situations.

### Cedar Creek Fire

In June 2016, HSSA packed up transport vehicles when a plea for help was sent to us during the midst of the Cedar Creek Fire. The fire, which would eventually burn over 40,000 acres, left a local animal shelter in direct danger. We traveled 12 hours to a makeshift holding area where dogs were being sheltered on a football field in crates, and brought 30 dogs back to Tucson. Our community raised \$15,000 for this mission, and all 30 dogs found their forever homes.


















# Volunteering her time

Lois has volunteered over 16,000 hours in the last 13 years. Lois facilitates adoptions, visits with healing dogs in our Second Chance Unit, and works with animals in need of behaviorial assistance, on a daily basis. Lois has proven herself indispensable to the Humane Society of Southern Arizona.

Lois volunteers between 8-10 hours a day at HSSA and averages walking 10 miles a day with shelter dogs. Lois believes that the more attention you give an animal the more they have a chance to thrive and become the best version of themselves.

HSSA's volunteers are the backbone of our organization and much of our work could not be completed without their dedication year after year.

### Red's Story

Red was homeless for 133 days, and his health was deteriorating because of the stress of a shelter setting. Red would sit in his kennel and incessantly lick the walls and gate, looking very nervous to shelter visitors. He was only taken out for a meet and greet with a potential adopter once in his four month stay at our shelter.

In Fiscal Year 2016, the Humane Society of Southern Arizona started a program to help shelter dogs that weren't able to be their best selves in a kennel. Red was the first candidate for our FAST program.

Red went home with a foster volunteer for the weekend, with the hope of finding a forever home. It worked! Red met his future adopter's son-in-law while hanging out in downtown Tucson. A few pictures were exchanged, and on Monday evening Red finally had a home! Red and his adopter are living happily together, where they enjoy daily walks and a lot of bonding time.

Red found his adopter on the streets of Tucson, along with 10 others dogs in the first few months of the program.




#### Merchandise and Adoptions


### **SWEAT for Pets: Walk, Run & Roll**

Our first-ever SWEAT For Pets: Walk, Run & Roll was held Sunday, November 1st, 2015 on the UA Campus Mall. More than 250 participants joined with hundreds of virtual online walkers and donors to help raise funds in a new peer-to-peer campaign. Along with sponsorships from Che's Lounge, GEICO, and Bookmans Entertainment Exchange, more than \$42,000 was raised, significantly growing the event over its previous incarnation as Mosey For Mutts.

HSSA's Events Team raised over 300,000 in Fiscal Year 2016










### New Home. New Hope.

We broke ground at the site of our new location, 635 W. Roger Road, Tucson, Arizona on Wednesday, December 14th, 2016.

HSSA staff and volunteers were joined by state, county and city dignitaries, including Senator Steve Farley, Mayor Jonathan Rothschild, Supervisor Sharon Bronson, Council Member Karin Uhlich, and adoptable dogs to help us celebrate.

The new campus design includes innovative and green building practices, including jumbo dog runs, several large off-leash play yards, a designated dog walking path, indoor/screened outdoor cat habitats, solar covered parking, the use of existing native plant life in landscaping, and rainwater harvesting.
