Seeing Stray Cats? We Can Help!

Through Trap Neuter Return (TNR), outdoor cats are humanely trapped and transported to a clinic for spay/neuter surgery, vaccinations, flea/tick medicine, and an ear-tip (the universal sign of an outdoor cat) before being returned to their outdoor homes. Over time, their numbers are reduced because they are no longer reproducing.



TNR is the only option to reduce the outdoor cat population in Pima County.

TNR benefits communities and reduces complaints by:



Improving bad behaviors like fighting, spraying and roaming to find a mate.



Improving community health.
Cats are vaccinated before return.



Providing effective rodent and insect control.



Reducing the population means no new kittens.



Saving taxpayer money by keeping cats out of municipal shelters.



Creating harmony among neighbors. Cats are better neighbors when properly managed.



Removing the cats.

New cats will simply move in and breed, therefore increasing the population.

Feeding bans

Cats will stay and look for a new source of food by eating garbage, scraps, and wildlife. Malnourished cats are more prone to disease and to birthing sick kittens.
