Trap-Neuter-Return is a program for feral cats and community cats. Cat colony caretakers can bring in ferals to the HSSA to be spayed or neutered and vaccinated to help control population and disease within a feral colony.

The Humane Society of Southern Arizona's TNR program is dedicated to reducing feral cat overpopulation and improving feral cats' quality of life.

The HSSA provides information and education to the community about humane colony management. Our Low-cost Spay & Neuter Clinic offers appointment-free sterilization and vaccination of feral cats and community cats.

What is a Feral or Community Cat?

Feral cats are born and live without any human contact. Feral cats are afraid of people; you can't hold them or pet them, and they must be caught using a humane cat trap. Community cats are homeless, abandoned domestic cats. They too, must be brought to HSSA in a humane cat trap.

TNR, no appointment necessary

Trapped cats can be brought to our clinic Tuesday-Saturday between 8 and 9 am, however surgery days may vary. **Please call in advance for weekly availability or check out our Facebook page for schedule changes.** Cats must be in humane traps, one cat per trap. Cats must be at least 3 months old and weigh 3 pounds.

If you are trapping more than two cats, please call the clinic in advance.
